Being full of himself, he can't help but slip little hints of his own presumed popularity to others. It becomes difficult to carry on a conversation with him and later he develops into a right down revolting person. After his friends realize that he is stuck on himself, they begin to drift away from him and become only his associates.

It is very easy to slide into self-conceit. The best prevention is to look at yourself through someone else's eyes. Be conscious of all of your faults and constantly strive to improve them. Be genuinely friendly to all people, including those people who in a lower grade than you. If you think you'll be degraded by associating with people you presume to be unpopular, forget it. Everyone likes the friendly person and no one likes the person who has his nose in the air.

Being content with your own possessions is the key to happiness, but being content with yourself can only lead to trouble. Never note yourself as simply "good enough" because "no one is perfect." "Whenever nature leaves a hole in a person's mind, she generally plasters it over with a thick coat of self-conceit."
